### **b) Official Plan Amendment #22 and Implementing Zoning By-law ZBL-2/17 – 260 Elgin Street West Post Public Meeting – Town Planner**

That Council adopt a by-law to amend the Official Plan of the Town of Arnprior, being Amendment No. 22 to change the Official Plan designation from Residential to Residential - Exception Twelve to allow the use of the dwelling and an accessory structure for retail sales; and

That Council adopt a temporary use by-law to change the zoning designation from “Residential One (R1)” to “Residential One – Exception Thirty-five - temporary (R1-E35-t)” to permit retail sales and the use of an accessory building for a home occupation for a maximum period of three (3) years subject to specific provisions and with the possibility of extensions to the time period by request and at Council’s discretion.

Whereas apparently there was a single complaint filed with the Corporation that a Business was not in compliance;

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And Whereas on the filing of that complaint the staff of the Corporation moved it forward leading to an investigation resulting in the current situation;

And Whereas proper procedure was followed in dealing with the complaint, it raises the issue that not all By-law complaints are equal and impact just one situation or individual;

And Whereas this particular business has been operating for the past 11 years with the full knowledge of the Corporation and Council(s) and no actions were taken over the extended period of time;

And Whereas the location in question was reassessed by MPAC and is paying Commercial taxes;

And Whereas that this business is not likely the only business that is operating within the Town that may be violating the Zoning By-law.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved That the staff of the Corporation survey and review all existing home businesses within the municipality and:

- a) Prepare a complete and total registry of the same;
- b) Review and compile a list of those businesses that are "in compliance" and those that are "not in compliance" with appropriate by-laws;
- c) Staff to make not of the issues that may exist with By-laws, make recommendations for changes to be presented to Council in a Staff Report for consideration in the upcoming Comprehensive Zoning By-law

Further Be Resolved That it be recognized that this situation exists with the knowledge of the business owners, the Corporation and Council therefore sharing responsibility for the situation today;

Further Be It Resolved That it is recommended to Council by this motion that all existing Home Businesses within the Town of Arnprior that are on the newly developed registry and are not in compliance be Grandfathered as they operate today, with no expansion rights and only for the current generation of Owners/Operators of the business. Should the current generation halt operation for any reason the business must be shut down or sold and relocated within a properly zoned area of Town, and appropriate notice given to those businesses;

Further Be It Resolved That it is directed by this motion that staff bring a report to Council as to how complaints made with the Corporation are to be reviewed and categorized in a manner as to ensure Council input, in such cases where they would have a wider impact rather than one person or situation. This would allow for the key issue to be dealt with, rather than just the side effect, and in a manner Council wishes the community at large to be considered.

- Item #8 - Page 15,16 &17 – Ottawa Valley Business – April 4, 2017
  - Businesses should be aware that on October 1, 2017 the Ontario Minimum wage increase to \$11.60. This is an increase of \$0.20 per hour.
  - April 1, 2017 the “Clean Drive Fee” for light trucks, car, etc. is being eliminated by the Province of Ontario.

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- If you're considering getting into local Municipal Councils or School Boards be forewarned that in 2019 the Federal Government is removing the one third exemption of income, which was previously permitted as non-taxable. The bottom line is compensation for being a Councillor in a small municipality will be significantly less due to this change. It should be noted that AMO is in the process of addressing this issue.
- The County of Renfrew is going to present a Canada 150th Anniversary Plaque to each municipality.
- In response to Councillor Lynch the CAO noted that staff has not received an official request from the Township of Laurentian Valley to participate in their "Safe Truck Driver Rodeo" for municipal public works personnel. If requested staff will look at sending applicable employees to attend.
- Item #9 – Page 44 – AMO – Correspondence – Federal Gas Tax Legacy Fund Payment
  - In response to Councillor Lynch the General Manager of Client Services/Treasurer confirmed the submission of the Federal Gas Tax Verification Forms.





- To raise money for the museum through the sale of tartan items in the museum store





# What is a Tartan? And Who Says So?

*The Scottish Register of Tartans Act 2008* says a tartan “is a design which is capable of being woven consisting of two or more alternating coloured stripes which combine vertically and horizontally to form a repeated chequered pattern.”

The Scottish Parliament created the Scottish Registry of Tartans “...to be a repository for the preservation of tartans...to be a source of information about tartans” and to set policies regarding them.

To be included in the register, a new tartan must “be a new design, unique to the register.”

## Background

- As part of 2016 Capital Budget, Council approved an assignment in the amount of \$2,500 to develop a Columbarium Site Plan for the Malloch Road Cemetery.
- In the summer of 2016, staff retained Lashley and Associates to undertake this design assignment.



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## Scope of Assignment

- Prepare concept plan for the future construction of several columbaria at the Malloch Road Cemetery.
- Designed in multiple phases to allow for expansion as uptake progressed.
- Provide a class 'D' cost estimate for the construction of the works.

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## Class 'D' Estimate

Phase	Landscaping Cost
Phase 1 (sized for 2 columbaria)	\$26,500
Phase 2 (sized for 2 columbaria)	\$19,150
Phase 3 (sized for 2 columbaria)	\$26,250
Phase 4 (Seating area/garden)	\$23,450
<b>Subtotal</b>	<b>\$95,350</b>
10% Construction Contingency	\$9,535
<b>Total (not including cost of columbaria)</b>	<b>\$104,885</b>

Note: Phases #1, #2, and #3 are designed to house a set of two columbaria each. The estimated cost to supply and install each set of columbaria is not included in the above estimates. Each phase of columbaria, could be in the range of \$40,000 - \$80,000 depending on size and features. The total cost of the project would therefore be in the range of \$225,000 - \$345,000.

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## Future Planning

- Additional capacity at Malloch Rd Cemetery from installation of columbaria can postpone capital cost for a third cemetery
- Concept plan and estimate can help inform long term planning documents



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## Next Steps

- Obtain feedback from CSAC and OAC (Complete).
- Provide final draft concept plan to Council for endorsement.
- Integrate detailed design and construction of Phase 1 into LRCF as cemetery reserve fund permits.

- This exhibition takes a look at our favourite games and toys over the past 130 years.

## Details

- Due to arrive Sept 5<sup>th</sup> will depart Nov 14<sup>th</sup>.
- Relevant to all grades in the Ontario Curriculum making it very attractive for all schools in our area.
- Advertising will start in the schools at the end of May in order to give teachers the opportunity to plan for the autumn and for the museum to maximize class scheduling.
- We are able to use toys from our own collection to supplement the exhibit with



## Why?

- Keeps the museum open at a time when it is normally closed
- Creates revenue and increases town's profile.
- Engages the community with a world standard exhibit relevant to all of our schools.
- Brings in tourists and visitors to Arnprior wanting to share in our story.



## Funding

- Funding requirements will be met wholly by a grant from the Department of Canadian Heritage via the Museum Assistance Program (MAP)

## Renfrew County

- County will be creating a time capsule to commemorate Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> birthday. There are two criteria.
  - 1) All municipalities have been asked to contribute to this by including items ( high level objects such as memorabilia, logo, pin, fire badge, some images) from our municipality that will fit into a 10.5 x 11" zip lock bag.



## Renfrew County

- 2) the bags or contents therein will be placed into a container which will be placed in a **cairn** created with rock from each municipality- in Arnprior's case- marble.



## Arnprior's Own Time Capsule ?

- Arnprior could create its own time capsule too using Arnprior related artefacts and images leaving higher level items for placement in the Renfrew County venue.
  - photographs of current items being manufactured in Arnprior
  - Comparative photographs or images of Arnprior from 150 years ago
  - Images of current historic buildings in Arnprior



## Arnprior's Own Time Capsule ?

- Images of new houses being built in Arnprior, their prices and modern conveniences within
- Pictures of all grade 6 students in Arnprior with their own account of where they think they will be and what they will be doing in 2067.
- Images of downtown revitalization (before/after)
- Pictures of new cars, their features and prices.
- 150<sup>th</sup> passport



## Storage and Cost

- Storage-Capsule can be stored in the museum suspended from the ceiling of the ground floor vault with bylaw posted in the vault speaking to the purpose of the capsule, when it is to be opened and by who.
- Cost - negligible on both counts although a proper container would ensure the longevity of the contents stored.
